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BIG FINISH is marking 25 years of **Doctor** Who audio adventures by going back to where it all began. *The Sirens of Time* was originally released in July 1999 starring Peter Davison, Colin Baker and Sylvester McCoy as the Fifth, Sixth and Seventh Doctors.

Now, the production is being given a 2024 makeover as Nicholas Briggs, who wrote and directed the story a quarter of a century ago, is reworking the story from its original digital audio tape (DAT) recordings.

This new release is a "director's cut" of the story. Where the first three episodes of the original release each focused on just one Doctor, this new version intercuts between all of them for a more narratively satisfying experience.

Nick says: "I've managed to rescue the original source material off ancient DAT tapes with the help of regular Big Finish sound designer and composer Toby Hrycek-Robinson who skilfully extracted the material, and I'm working now on creating a version of the story like no other before it... again!" The Sirens of Time Redux also features new sound design and music. And in addition there are brand-new behind-the-scenes extras available on the limited editions (selling out fast) with the three Doctor actors reminiscing about their first ever Big Finish recording and the 25 years of audio productions since, yourex

I can't wait for all these to come out – and that's without mentioning the conclusion of the Sixth Doctor's 40th birthday celebrations! **VORTEX**

CAROLE ANN Ford takes centre stage once again in Family Ties, the second series of Susan's War. Gallifrey has sent a summons to all its children. Every Time Lord, every renegade and prodigal, has been called up for the Time War. Susan has returned home and joined the Gallifreyan war effort against the Daleks.

The first box set saw Susan working with some Time Lords we know from Big Finish's various **Time War** ranges including Veklin and Rasmus – and Paul McGann's Doctor popped up too!

The series **Susan's War** was developed from *All Hands on Deck*, a **Short Trip** written by Eddie Robson in 2017, which saw the Eighth Doctor trying to prevent Susan from becoming involved in the temporal conflict.

This second release, Family Ties, features two adventures with the return of Sonny McGann as Susan's son Alex Campbell, and Jonathon Carley as the War Doctor.

Producer Heather Challands tells *Vortex*: "It's a great range to be a part of and it's intriguing to tackle the character of Susan and where she is at this point in her life. And then, the deal is really sealed when you say: 'and the War Doctor is going to be there as well!' That's just irresistible because it's not been done yet.

"It was brilliant working with Carole – the recording days were really enjoyable. It was so lovely to hear Carole reprise the role and stretch the character of Susan as well. It felt like we were breaking new ground – not bad for a character who's been around for 61 years!"

Heather says: "The Lost Son is the story that we open with. We have the previous team from Susan's War front and centre in Veklin and Susan who have a nice and established dynamic. They bounce off each other rather well considering they're chalk and cheese.

"Susan and Veklin are sent to Materos where a little boy has been kidnapped and the Priestess Vesselina, his mother, thinks that the Daleks are responsible – but it might not be them. There's a lot of political intrigue as they try to figure out what's happened

to the boy and, in the course of that, Susan has to confront some very painful memories.

"It was lovely to produce a femalecentric script, and it is clear that the theme throughout is mothers and motherhood. I think all of the characters, bar Alex, are women, and it was very, enjoyable exploring these different types of women and their interpersonal relationships. They're all very different characters, and it was great to be able to show that sort of breadth."

New to Big Finish writer Sarah tells Vortex: "I'd been writing audio for a while before Susan's War came along as I co-created and co-wrote a continuing drama series called Station Road for a community radio station in Manchester I learnt loads about writing for audio from that project. Then in 2021, I wrote a podcast episode for the Tales from Malory Towers audio series through the CBBC Writers Room. I really enjoyed writing for that - I was a fan of the novels when I was younger. And shortly after that I was introduced to Matt Fitton at Big Finish.

"We had a Zoom meeting as this took place during lockdown and had a conversation about **Susan's War**. I was invited to come up with some story ideas and I did a lot of research before submitting my pitches – *The Lost Son* being the one that was commissioned. Whilst the loss of Alex was a long time ago, I thought it would be interesting to see how Susan could be exploited as a grieving mother.

"I'm incredibly grateful to Matt and Heather at Big Finish for allowing me the opportunity to write for this great series. Being given the freedom to create new characters, planets and stories is such a privilege for a writer. Susan's War is the perfect show for me to debut as a Big Finish writer because it is female-led, and most of my other stories for audio, stage or screen feature extraordinary women like Susan and Veklin.

"I really enjoyed writing their scenes as I felt that their relationship grew in series one, and it was important to keep on that path when we join them again in series two. It was a definite highlight knowing that Carole Ann would be playing Susan – I really wanted to give her a decent story to open this new series with."

PETER ANGHELIDES has written The Golden Child, the second story in the set. A key ally to Gallifrey has winked out of existence. When Susan investigates, she finds someone else is also interested in the altered timeline – her grandfather!

around. The War Doctor is not meant to be there, but while he is, he's going to get up to mischief."

Peter continues: "My brief was for Susan to investigate a temporal incursion and find her grandfather in a form she doesn't know because he's been thrown back in time "Susan's experiences with her grandfather have been generally positive, whether in *The Five Doctors* on the TV or with the Eighth Doctor in an earlier **Susan's War** story. The War Doctor, however, is a darker, more disreputable character, disavowed even by the Doctors who came after him. Why has he turned up, and should Susan rely on him?

"Susan's now met half a dozen different versions of her grandfather, but is herself the same person who first left Gallifrey with him. That's an interesting dynamic to play with – is her attitude unchanged over the centuries now that she's returned to their home world, or has her perspective evolved without

having gone through the most radical change of regeneration herself?"

How enjoyable is writing something where time is out of joint, and you can have a bit more freedom to work with changes in history? Peter says: "It's very enjoyable to explore what a Time War means while making it recognisable to listeners as a conflict with meaningful risks, stakes and dangers. If you can simply change the past in an ad hoc manner, then there'd be no jeopardy for your story. You have to establish some understandable rules, so devising those was important.

"Listeners (and writers) are mere mortals who cannot revisit the past or hop into the future – temporal conflicts are outside our experience. So a writer can be inventive about the novel stratagems that an enemy could adopt and weaknesses they would look to exploit. For our heroes, what counter-manoeuvres should they devise and what spycraft can they adopt to thwart those enemy



But this version is from the future of the Time War, and he's not the man Susan remembers...

Heather says: "In The Golden Child, Susan gets a call from one of her friends, Andolar – an archivist, who says that one of Gallifrey's future key allies who Andolar has studied for nearly all her life, has gone.

"And suddenly, no one can remember him. They don't know who he is or where he is – and the great events that he's meant to achieve are in flux. So Susan and Andolar go back in time to discover what's gone wrong and they find themselves in the middle of an assassination attempt that shouldn't be happening.

"They try to rectify events, except it turns out that's very tricky to do... especially when somebody's grandfather is involved! The War Doctor has been jolted back through the Time War and has ended up at an earlier point than he exists, so there is still a Paul McGann Eighth Doctor incarnation running



during a skirmish in the Time War.

tactics? Urgency and action is a good thing for compelling drama – but in a Time War, what does urgency mean? What's an action you cannot undo?

"In my story, one of Gallifrey's subterfuges has not only made Time Lords vulnerable to a fresh attack, it's also tied their hands for defending against it. Susan recognises that she must take a risky and painstaking initiative until her impulsive grandfather throws a spanner in the works!"

Heather was delighted to be able to work with a particular friend on this series. She explains: "I've been friends with Jonathon for a couple of years now. We meet at various social gatherings but until now I've not had the chance to work with him, and it was really lovely.

"The War Doctor and Susan are a great combination. It's nice to be able to ask the question of how these two characters would interact, especially when they have changed so much from when they first knew each other, or even since they last saw each other. The War Doctor is very different to the Eighth Doctor, so even if Susan's more or less on

the same path as she was when she last met him, he is wildly different.

"He's quite secretive and antagonistic when Susan encounters him, and she doesn't quite understand. She knows that it's her grandfather, but she can't connect the dots or work out how her grandfather has become this person. He's also placed in opposition

to her and she can't get a straight answer from him. Susan doesn't know whether he's there to help or to hinder, or if he cares or not.

"So there are lots of questions from Susan and a hesitancy on the War Doctor's part to answer them. If you look at it from his perspective, he's engaging in the relationship when he feels like a different person, so letting himself have a bond with Susan again is tricky for him, although we have got some nice moments of familiarity between the two.

"This the latest that Susan has ever seen her grandfather. It's a new experience for both of them. I feel like we're adding to the canon a little bit. It's very exciting." VORIEX





WHEN BIG Finish announced The War Doctor Begins was coming to an end, there was great sadness across fandom. But that despair was soon replaced by joy after it was

announced that a brand-new series, **The War Doctor Rises**, would move his story into the next phase.

In the first volume, Morbius the Mighty, the War Doctor doesn't have it easy as an old enemy returns.

The War Doctor has been forced out of the fight and the battle has moved on in his absence. There are new powers, new anomalies, and new excuses from him to keep his distance. With only Cora, his nurse, to keep him company on the forest planet of Lull, the War Doctor is content to leave his old life behind.

But something is stirring in the depths of a twisted planet. An old, embittered foe harbours a terrible grudge against the Doctor. And when a chance encounter gives this enemy the chance to escape, nobody is safe in his quest for vengeance.

From the depths of the stormy Valley, Morbius will rise...

Morbius the Mighty also serves as a sequel to **Dark Gallifrey**: Morbius, as the tyrannous Time Lord emerges into a very different era and seeks bitter revenge on his foe. And as if that wasn't enough, a third power with their own agenda watches from the shadows.

Returning to Big Finish to portray Morbius on audio is BAFTAnominated actor Samuel West (Slow Horses, All Creatures Great and Small). And the wonderful Jonathon Carley once again gives voice to the War Doctor played by the late Sir John Hurt on television.

Producer David Richardson tells Vortex: "We're journeying through the War Doctor's life in phases. We've



heard what happened immediately after he regenerated on Karn and experienced the subsequent initial adventures in this new form. Now we're some time later on in his life. He has settled into his skin, is more sure-footed and ready to take on all that Skaro (and Gallifrey) might throw at him.

"This first box set is a single three-hour story. The War Doctor rises and so does Morbius – and for him it's after the events of **Dark Gallifrey**. What we have is a battle between two titans, except one of them – the Doctor – is infirm and recuperating from being poisoned. It's a Tim Foley script so of course it's packed with rich ideas, detailed settings and glorious dialogue."

Cora; Gareth Armstrong (**Doctor Who**: The Masque of Mandragora, **Blake's 7**) as Judd; Pamela Nomvete (Andor) as 1-8-1; Theo Solomon (Temple) as Herving; and regular **Doctor Who** monster voice Nicholas Briggs as the Daleks.

Writer Tim was delighted to be given the chance to write a full box set pitching the old Time Lord rivals against one another. He says: "David gave me complete freedom to pitch an epic adventure for the War Doctor. He's wonderful like that, and it's great the way he's been pushing this writer-led approach across the Doctor's different ages. I asked if I could write for Morbius again following the events of Dark Gallifrey as I felt he was justified a return. He's a military general from the Time Lords' history whilst they're fighting their biggest war yet, it feels like there's tons to explore there!

"I really got my teeth into Morbius in **Dark Gallifrey** – the way he approached everything, that ego of his that was bubbling out over the script. There was just so much more of him that I wanted to share.

"Because **Dark Gallifrey**: Morbius was inspired by Frankenstein, it also felt like a natural fit to put Morbius in this new epic story. A large part of Morbius the Mighty is inspired by Star Trek's The Wrath of Khan which has its genesis in Moby Dick. Both are fabulous revenge stories which basically boil down to a one-on-one. I considered what Morbius was angry at the War Doctor for, what was driving him – and that's where the drama stems from."

How did Tim feel about getting to shape the entire box set on his own? He tells Vortex: "Iloved it, it scratches a different bit of your brain! I enjoy working in a gang on a box set or a mini-series, but there's a real delight when you go into your own writing turret and emerge with a great big adventure.

"The War Doctor is a tricksy incarnation to write for! Because he was barely seen on television, everybody has their own idea of who this Doctor is: I was intrigued how dark I'd be allowed to go. The BBC are never going to allow a gun-toting Rambo-style anti-hero, but there are other ways of amping up the ruthlessness. This box set is one of his 'rising' – he's going to be scaling some truly dark heights."

Did Tim particularly enjoy pitting this Doctor against Morbius, especially given his more ruthless side? He says: "I think all Doctors do well with a villainous foil. We have this with the War Doctor and the Barber-Surgeon in Robert Valentine's **The War Doctor Begins**: He Who Fights With Monsters. I think Morbius works as the perfect

antagonist to the Doctor. They're both Time Lord outsiders who've made their mark and they're both in the wrong fight. The Doctor shouldn't be a warrior, and Morbius certainly shouldn't be in this Time War...

"In a nutshell – Morbius wants revenge and he's going to stop at nothing to get it."

MAKING A welcome return to the gaitors and battered leather jacket of the War Doctor is actor Jonathon, who has won universal acclaim for his performance. Vortex asks him how it felt being back in the part now he has been able to fully establish

himself in the role?

Jonathan says: "Without wanting to sound too blase it just felt like getting back into the flow. When we finished **The War Doctor Begins** we'd recorded 18 episodes, which is a lot, but it meant we had a good rhythm going by that point. The main thing for me now is a sense of confidence, acceptance and enjoyment.

"Having the range renewed was hugely validating – I've known about it for a long time now. Admittedly we've made people sweat a bit, but what greater compliment is there than to have the audience who have been so generous and receptive, all but begging for more! I do apologise to all those I've had to lie to.

"Learning about the new direction was exciting. We now know we can really challenge the character and myself, and push the stories to some extreme places."

> THE WAR Doctor Begins saw the Doctor finding his feet as he learned that his way of thinking was different, having been engineered to take part in the Time War. In this next set he's







his own mind.

Jonathon explains: "The War Doctor 'began' for a long time - I think he's cooked now! He's kind of entering his prime, he's let 'the Doctor' go, he's over the break up. So he's going to be less precious, and perhaps less arrogant and reckless, and we are pretty much faced with the consequence of that in Morbius the Mighty where he's become a casualty, invalided and a very bad patient precisely because he is incapable of doing the very job he is determined to see through now, relegated to being an observer. His worst nightmare.

"Finding out the War Doctor was facing Morbius really raised the stakes. But then for me as an actor, I was wondering, is Sam going to reprise the role or will we see a new incarnation? I heard him playing Morbius in The Eighth Doctor

Adventures when I was in college and he really fleshed him out into a more nuanced and complex character, more than just a monster.

"So when it was confirmed that Sam was coming back I was both excited and quite intimidated because it's Sam West! He's one of the finest actors in the country. But everyone said how lovely he was and that he was a big Doctor Who fan

so I knew I'd be in good company.

"HOWEVER, disaster struck the day before recording when I tested positive for COVID-19 and had to pull out of the session. Ironically, I was genuinely invalided from the war. So I missed the chance to meet the man, the myth, the Morbius. I was gutted. But I did get to hear some extracts from the recording and you can tell he was having great fun. There's reason if there ever was one for a rematch. Morbius Strikes Back!"

The actor was also delighted to be reunited with the writer of the box set. Jonathon explains: "It was a real treat to have this set written by Tim. We met on my audition day right at the very beginning, and I look back on that encounter very fondly. Tim also lives 'up north' so we meet up occasionally and have become very good friends. He's been teasing me about what he wanted to write. So having Tim alongside to launch this next step of the War Doctor's journey feels very appropriate.

"But also with the War Doctor being injured, he does deteriorate at points. That gave me a great excuse to play with the energy and also the voice to really get across how worn down he is."

David had a personal highlight: "Jonathon and Sam going head to head. It's breathtaking, Proper. full-on thrilling drama."

And Tim agrees: "Sam was sensational, again. And I love Jonathon's performance. Just wait for a certain scene in the third hour where they give it their absolute all..." VORTEX

Producer David Richardson says: "Time is running out in many ways in Last Words. River's data has been pulled out of the Library and placed in an artificial body – but it has a very limited lifespan and her days are numbered. The same can be said for the entire planet, as the solar flares are about to burn across the Earth.

"Rob has written an apocalyptic story for our times, but one full of both surprises and hope as we weave our way through its four-hour duration. Like the much-loved The Diary of River Song: Friend of the Family which was met with great acclaim on its release, this is one writer's vision of a River Song box set—an emotional journey through the darkness and the light. It's heartbreaking, exciting and doomladen and, perhaps when you least expect it, uplifting and inspiring."

The four books together, as well as revealing an important chapter in River's (after)life, serve as a prequel to the 1975 television story *The Ark*

Writer Rob tells Vortex: "To be honest, when I was writing Last Words I was under the impression I was writing the very last River Song story EVER - hence the title! But I'm delighted that the magnificent Alex isn't putting down her sonic trowel any time soon.

"The brief on this one was to write a prequel to The Ark in Space but the thing I wanted out of it was to explore how River negotiates her life after the Doctor is no longer in it. How you deal with your great love behind you is something a lot of us do have to make

end and eventually we all die. "Last Words is a detective story in four chapters. River Song has been ripped from her digital afterlife and put in a temporary cloned body in order to solve a mystery. But that body has a six-week lifespan and


unless she succeeds, she'll perish.

"It was great having the space to spend time with River Song somewhere she's never been before, and that's with her diary full, the Doctor entirely in her past, wrenched from the Library and having to finally confront the last fact of life from which she has so far been spared. I did notice a bit of discussion online about the idea of taking River out of the Library being a cheat, but there really is only one story worth taking her out of the Library for, and the clue to that is of course in the title."

Director Ken Bentley was delighted to return and take River in a new direction. He explains: "River Song is such a great story world and David has found a way to take the series in an exciting new direction. I also really enjoy long-form storytelling, it's always been one of the great things about working with Big Finish, they have the time to explore. So I'm even more excited about the series now than I was when we first started way-back-when!

"I've been listening to the final edits of Last Words and you can hear Alex's enthusiasm for the role in every scene. There's no better gift for a writer or director than to have a lead who's invested in the role and keen to keep exploring the possibilities. Leading the charge are Davros and the Cyber Leader, with Terry Molloy

and David Banks reprising their roles. And, for their first appearance since appearing in the TV episode *The Two Doctors*, the carnivorous Androgums will feature with Jon Culshaw playing the bloodthirsty celebrity chef Stunrib.


Responding to a distress call from an old friend, the Doctor and Mel find themselves in 'Cyberia', a prison camp run by an even older foe. But this time, the Cyber Leader's machinations are just the tip of one very sinister iceberg, one that will test the Doctor to his very limit, and beyond...

The Trials of a Time Lord is a six-part story told over three discs, with the first two episodes scripted by Rochana Patel, the third and fourth by Katharine Armitage, and

the final two by Stewart Pringle.

Jonathan Powell, who has succeeded Jacqueline Rayner as producer on the series, tells Vortex: "This was a thrilling and surprisingly freeing brief to be given straight out of the gate as producer for The Sixth Doctor Adventures – celebrate 40 years of the character in pretty much any way you see fit! The only steer was the potential title The Trials of a Time Lord, intended to act as a bookend to the already in the works anniversary box set The Quin Dilemma.

"Script editor Robert Valentine and I had never worked together before this release. Fortunately, we got on like a house on fire, and after about an hour's excited chatter on Zoom we'd



managed to beat out the bare bones of what we wanted this box set to be.

"I was especially keen from the off on bringing David back as the Cyber Leader. His performance really sums up 1980s **Doctor Who** for me and everything we're celebrating here in *The Trials of a Time Lord:* familiar territory boldly reinvented. That's the Sixth Doctor era in a nutshell, a show acknowledging and celebrating its past while venturing bravely to pastures new.

"Our three fantastic writers were also seamless in their collaboration, fleshing our outlines out in really unexpected ways to produce an epic script beyond anything Rob and I could have hoped for."

Rob says: "Jac came up with the title *The Quin Dilemma* for the first of our two Sixth Doctor fortieth



anniversary stories, and it seemed obvious to me that its companion piece should be called *The Trials of a Time Lord*. So this one was a title-first idea that suggested a series of Herculean labours, and then Jon and I had a long brainstorming session where we came up with the basic storyline to give our writers.

"We've got the Sixth Doctor, Peri, Mel and Cybermen – could there be a more explicit celebration of 40 years of the Sixth Doctor? The Doctor's birthday party certainly continues with this adventure, and it's one we've thrown as much of his era into as we possibly could."

ROCHANA HAS written the opening two parts and says:

"The brief for this one was quite different to the normal process of writing for Big Finish. The over-arching concept for the six episodes was already in place with a

basic treatment provided. So very much like the original *The Trial of a Time Lord*, each writer could deliver their separate episodes which would then be combined to make one much larger story.

"I was given the Doctor, Mel and the classic 1980s Cybermen. While the main plot-points were mapped out by the treatment, I still had a lot of freedom to flesh-out the details and make the episodes my own. And so that's what I did...

"The Doctor and Mel arrive on an alien world, and discover a horrific prison camp run by the Cybermen... but that's just the start. This is an epic story filled with countless surprises!

"I really wanted to make the most of the elements provided. Episode one is a very traditional Cyber-tale, ramped up to the max so I could make the most of the nostalgic thrills. And for episode two I really wanted to push the narrative in a different direction and do new things. Hopefully my episodes will

provide both old-school thrills, and something new and different."

Rochana particular enjoyed researching the Cybermen when writing this script. She explains: "I really loved writing for the 1980s Cybermen and deliberately set out to tell a story that highlighted how different their versions are.

"Rewatching the 1980s TV episodes,

KATHARINE IS the writer of the third and fourth episodes. She admits: "It was beyond exciting to be asked to be a part of *The Trials of a Time Lord*. I've wanted to write for the beloved Sixth Doctor for years and to get to work on his anniversary story was so much fun and such a privilege. The things I got to write were the perfect

hit, but there was loads of space for creating our own interpretations of the story and to do some world-building. There was a lot of back and forth between the writers, the script editor and the producer as we expanded the world and tried to weave our narratives together.

"From the start we each had two cliffhangers so that shaped the stories



you'll see everything from anger, to panic, to panic, to panic and it makes for a very different enemy. They're conspicuously emotional, despite their claims to the contrary! Most modern stories focus on them as 'emotionless silver giants' and as a result they often get reduced to stomping robots, but that's not what makes them terrifying.

"There's a living person behind every steel mask who is still alive, in pain and desperate to be free – and that is what I wanted to explore here; to make sense of the contradictory nature of these Cybermen, who still seem to be connected to the emotions yet are always led by the same distinctive leader."

pick 'n' mix of everything I adore about this Doctor's era. I'm still buzzing I got to work on it!

"The brief had some key things that each of us three writers needed to

and, hopefully, gave the whole thing a feeling of constant momentum and increasingly bonkers twists!"

Summing up her story, Kat says:
"The Doctor is trapped in a TV show
with a million things that want to kill
him. Meanwhile, Mel wants to find
the rebels fighting back against the
shows. Both of them want to find out
who's the real power behind it all...
I'm not sure I can say any more than
that without entering Spoiler City!

"Everything on this one was a highlight! I loved getting to play with that delicious combination of fun, humour, satire and darkness which, for me, sums up the Sixth Doctor. It's a multi-coloured world with shadowy depths and it was brilliant to get to

swerve between the two. It was also fun building in bits of satire about contemporary TV: I love telly but I also like pointing out how daft it can be (and, by extension, how daft we humans can be). My favourite bits, though, are probably the jokes I got to write for all these amazing characters—and everyone gets a 'hero moment' which were all joyous to create."

STEWART HAS the

concluding two parts. He says:
"I was so thrilled when Rob
asked me to be involved with
The Trials of a Time Lord
particularly as I had only just
finished a big old rewatch of Season
23 via the Collection Blu-rays, and
been reminded of how brilliant so
much of it is. This story feels as
much of a tribute to Season 22 as 23,
but I love that the way it has been
conceived reflects something of the
process behind 23, although a lot
less tortured!

"There was so much in my brief. I was wrapping the whole story up and there's a real sense of constantly gathering momentum and accretive twists throughout the whole thing,

which meant that by the time episodes five and six come around, there is a huge amount in play – a lot of balancing and quite complex plotting and structuring. The challenge with anything like this, where you're one third of a writing team and you want to do justice to a lot of incredible actors, characters and the ideas which have gone before you, is finding the space to fit everything in while at the same time giving it your own twist.

"I've obviously read all about Robert Holmes and his dislike of a 'shopping list' brief, but this was the first one I'd actually faced for myself. I'm not going to pretend there weren't moments of blind panic, but there were also those where the pieces slipped perfectly together and you think, in the immortal delivery of David Banks, 'Excellent!'.

"I hope it's a true love letter to Sixie, and most particularly to Seasons 22 and 23, two of the most inventive, ambitious, original series fun everyone was having. Colin couldn't put the script down when I first sent it to him, and though we all worked our socks off in studio there was a lot of laughter between (and sometimes during) takes, and I think we all felt we were making something very special."



Jonathan adds: "The recording days themselves were the most complicated sessions I've ever run, as you'll understand when listening, The Trials of a Time Lord is a mad, mad ride! Rob and I also cameo in a scene as a pair of bar flies called Broodmaw and Zee-Zox. so listen out for that.

"But the most wonderful thing about the sessions were how much

Michael Troughton has effortlessly slipped into the role made famous by his father in **The Second Doctor Adventures** audio range, with Frazer Hines as Jamie at his side. And two will become three with the release of the next box set, *Conspiracy of Raven*, in which they will be joined by Wendy Padbury as an older Zoe.

Producer and writer Mark Wright – one of the two writers on this new trio of adventures with Nicholas Briggs – has been delighted with the reaction to the first two box sets: Beyond War

 ${\it Games} \ {\it and} \ {\it James} \ {\it Robert} \ {\it McCrimmon}.$

Mark says: "Both Nick and myself have been really bowled over by how this run of **The Second Doctor Adventures** has landed. People seem to be really enjoying it. They're investing in Michael's performance and they're investing in our new regular character of Raven and the return of Jamie.

"Such a lovely reaction gives us a burst of energy to keep moving the narrative onwards in really exciting new directions. I'm really looking forward to what we've got coming up and to see how this box set is received because Conspiracy of Raven pushes the arc into new territory."

Director and co-writer Nick adds:

"I'm enormously pleased, Michael's performance has gone down really well. And it's been great to have Frazer playing an older version of Jamie joining the Second Doctor on his missions. The series feels like it's got real momentum now."

Conspiracy of Raven features three closely-linked adventures. Mark says: "We've approached this set differently to the previous two box sets, and Nick and I took it forward by planning and writing it ourselves. We felt for this release that we needed to do that.

"So as writers we have really been a tag-team on this one. Throwing ideas backwards and forwards and seeing how it's come together has been fascinating.

"It's a big six-part adventure that is split into three different stories, as is the nature of an arc. But they're done in a different way to James Robert McCrimmon which was also three separate stories."

Nick has written the first adventure in the set. Kippers. He explains: "I wanted it to be a bit of a character study where the Doctor and his Time Lord 'handler' Raven are stuck working with each other against a new, malevolent force. The theme is one of powerlessness. The Doctor is used to feeling ineffective and outnumbered, but it's an entirely new thing for Raven. And how they both cope with it and each other's response to their respective reactions forms the core of this story. It's also very important for the ongoing story arc, introducing the strange Kippers. Definitely something fishy about them!"

MARK WRIGHT

MARK IS the writer of the second adventure. He says: "For my story, Catastrophe Theory, it's one where the title dropped into my head first and the story came from that.

That's not always a good way to work but it really helped me on this one to have this image of supposed catastrophe theory.

"It's a bit like chaos theory where a butterfly beats its wings on one side of the Earth and a hurricane happens on the other side – and trying to kind of map that onto time, really.

"In Catastrophe Theory, Zoe makes her return. But the question is, is it really Zoe? We'll find that out very quickly. I wanted to make it a very traditional Second Doctor adventure. I wanted Zoe being





brilliant and the wonderful scientist that she is. And now, she has all this life experience that she didn't have when we saw her on TV. So I was really keen for the Doctor and Zoe to be working together in the same way we had Jamie and the Doctor in the last box set.

"I also wanted to look at the nature of the Doctor's missions, so this title suggests many different things. The Doctor's starting to see the threads of the conspiracy, hence the Conspiracy of Raven.

"We were delighted when we found out that the collective noun for ravens is a conspiracy! Emma Noakes, who plays Raven so brilliantly, was really excited about that. Raven has really become an integral part of this range now. We weren't sure initially whether we were going bring the character back after Beyond War Games, but Emma has taken to the role and is loving playing the different facets of Raven."

NICK AND Mark collaborated for the final story in the set, The Vanishing Point. Nick explains: "The writing process for the box set worked thus: I wrote the first one and Mark script edited it. Mark wrote a plot line for the second one, I reworked that a bit and then he wrote a script based on that reworked plot. Then I reworked the script to make sure it fitted neatly between the first and third stories, because I'd already written the third story, The Vanishing Point, by the time Mark was delivering Catastrophe Theory.

"The Vanishing Point came from a storyline by Mark which I substantially reworked. Then I wrote a script based on that storyline and Mark gave me some notes on the script!

"Clear as mud? A real team effort and very rewarding."

Mark adds: "With The Vanishing Point, again, it was the title that we started from with the idea of

an observatory that sits outside time and space. That concept and the title really came together.

"I don't want to spoil things and reveal too much about The Vanishing Point, but again it takes us into new territory. It opens up what has really been going on with the Doctor's missions for the Time Lords and leaves it on... well, an outrageous cliffhanger! I can't say much more, except that the whole box set is very traditional.

"This is something you could film on a Friday night at Lime Grove, Studio D, trying to keep some of the writing quite modern but to have



a late 1960s, early 1970s feel of it being shot in a studio. I'm thinking of those sound effects now!"

Nick adds that his highlight was: "Having Jamie, Zoe and the Doctor together. That's been great. And it's been really lovely to spend time with Wendy again. I haven't worked with her in a while, and I've known her for ages. She's so good and she really enjoyed the freedom of not having to sound 21 years old! Michael is always just such a joyful presence. He's becoming more and more like his dad since doing the part and talking about it. He really engages with the scripts. It's so rewarding when your Doctor is as excited about the stories as you are. And his performance just gets better and better. I really look forward to directing him."

Mark adds: "Michael continues to delight, he works in such a clever way. He's got the essence of the Second Doctor but he's not doing an intricate impression of his dad. And I think that's key to it. He's capturing the spirit of him. He's bringing his own playfulness to it, but he's also bringing that

connection to the 1960s."

Vortex can exclusively reveal that rather than one Second Doctor set a year, there will now be two.

Nick adds: "Because it's been so well received we'll be increasing the frequency of **The Second Doctor Adventures** box sets to two a year in the not too distant future. But more news on that later!" FORTEX

WHEN PRODUCER Cavan
Scott was asked to take on The
Novel Adaptations range, he
quickly tested the waters to find
out which of Virgin Media's The
New Adventures and The Missing
Adventures were most popular.

Cav explains: "It was one of those no-brainers. When I was asked to take over as producer of **The Novel Adaptations**, I started asking people who noes they would like to hear, and *The Highest Science* by Gareth Roberts was on every single list.

"Everyone remembers it really fondly: it was Gareth's first published **Doctor Who** story. It introduces the Chelonians, and there are lots of events which shouldn't happen but are interconnected by the Fortean Flicker. It really does sum up that era of *The New Adventures*.

"The other reason I thought The Highest Science would be a good choice is that I wanted to give Bernice Summerfield a story on her on with the Doctor.

"We've tried to keep this adaptation as near to the original book as we possibly can. We had to change some things for modern sensibilities but we found a way around them. Otherwise we've kept it as pure as possible."

The adaptation was handled by Jacqueline Rayner, who has previously adapted *Love and War* by Paul Cornell as well as several other early Big Finish audios starring Lisa Bowerman as Benny.

How handy was her previous experience of adapting The New Adventures? She explains: "Well, it means I'd at least had some practice! But the challenge is always the same keeping the shape of the original while taking into account any restrictions posed. What you'll find with authors like Gareth and Paul is that everything in their stories is intertwined nothing happens in isolation so things which may initially seem ripe for cutting turn out to be essential to the story. Great for the reader, but aaaargh for the adaptor! Then, because you have a limited duration in which to tell the story, you need to make

sure everything in the adaptation is necessary but at the same time you need to keep in character stuff, or what's the point of dramatising it?


"There were particular challenges on *The Highest Science* as it had to be written for a pretty small cast so a lot of characters had to be dropped or merged. We managed to stretch it out by doubling up some voice-treated roles and by having some characters on just one recording day – but that added extra challenges as it restricted the characters' interactions (I made lots of spreadsheets!)."

Director Scott Handcock adds: "It's always tough taking a story produced in one medium and converting it to another. Cav's been instrumental in overseeing that Jac's adaptation focuses on all the right areas which makes it a cracking audio adventure in its own right. Howard Carter's provided us with the most sublime score, leading the listener through the various layers and really helping to guide the story, and I've worked with sound designer Neil Gardner on loads of projects before now – he's an absolute genius."
