Snare guest stars Camille Coduri as Jackie Tyler

– Rose's mother, with Alex Austin as Kevin and

Hannah Brown as Marlene – his posh artist friend.

Writer Tim says: "I was a kid of the wilderness years, with a knapsack full of books, audios and videos, but 2005 saw actual **Doctor Who** actually broadcast on the actual telly! It was incredibly special for me then, and the Ninth Doctor and Rose continue to be incredibly special for me now. Wherever you are on the globe, you will surely have heard my whoops of joy when I was asked to write for this new series. "It's great to kick things off with *Snare*, a characterdriven opener back on the Powell Estate. We're picking up right after *Father's Day*, where the family drama from that story still continues to make ripples. You'll meet Kevin – one of Rose's old friends – and learn what secrets are being hidden in his dad's home. You'll also encounter Jackie's cooking, so stay strong!" VONTEX

WHEN THE world was a very different place as the COVID-19 pandemic had shut things down, Big Finish was able to remain creative.

Actors were confined to their homes which meant a host of stars, such as David Tennant, were available thanks to the power of remote recording. One of the fantastic ranges

from that time was **Dalek Universe**, a series in which the Tenth Doctor found himself allied with Anya Kingdom and android Mark Seven from the Space Security Service.

And now, we can find out more about the agents before their encounter with the Doctor in the first volume of **Space Security Service** – *Voord in London*. Jane

Slavin and Joe Sims reprise their roles as Anya and Mark.

Producer Simon Guerrier says:
"This series has long been in the
works – arguably since Terry Nation
tried to launch his Daleks television
show back in the 1960s. We've
taken that as our cue and come up
with a fast-moving, fun series of
adventures for the two Space Security



Service agents who were such a hit in the **Dalek Universe** range.

"We start with Anya back in London in the 20th century, working undercover as a cop on the trail of one group of aliens and then getting caught up with another. Soon the action moves to... well, just wait until you hear it!"

Script editor John Dorney tells Vortex: "Simon and I had a very interesting back and forth as we tried to figure out what this series should be, and I suggested it could in effect be The Man from UNCLE in space. Anya would be a kind of Napoleon Solo figure in a slightly more emotional way, while Mark would be like Illya Kuriakin. We felt that could work well.

"There's something about Terry Nation's stories where they feel like they all come from the same place. You can put the Space Security Service up against the Voord, and the result is a pretty natural combination, not at all mismatched. We felt the same with **Dalek Universe** which is a fully realised, almost *TV Comic*-style world, bringing in characters like



Mark from the Dalek pilot which helped it all come together."

THE FIRST three episodes of Space Security Service are The Voord in London by Big Finish newcomer LR Hay, The Thal from G.R.A.C.E. by Felicia Barker and Allegiance by Angus Dunican.

Lynn [LR] says: "As a writer, the Whoniverse seemed an unrealistic

dream but then I met a few of the Big Finish team at a writing event. They were super-nice and it didn't hurt that Rob Shearman appeared out of nowhere and recommended me to them. Gobsmacking! I had no idea he even knew who I was, but I'd had contact with his wife, Janie. When she'd watched the TV episodes I'd acted in [Unforgotten], Rob had been there too. His Dalek and The Chimes of Midnight adventures are among the absolute top **Doctor Who** scripts in my opinion, so I had a real Harriet Jones moment when he said, 'Lynn! I'm Rob Shearman,' and all I could think was, 'Yes, I know who you are!" Speaking of her brief, Lynn says: Bond / The Man From UNCLE in space.' What's not to love? I was in! As more detail came out, I was

thrilled at the concept of giving the **Space Security Service** its own spin-off – particularly as we were building it around Anya and Mark. I love the way they play off each other, as they did in **Dalek Universe** with the Tenth Doctor, so it seemed a natural progression.

"It's so satisfying the way Mark links back to the early days, a Terry Nation character that Big Finish has run with. And Anya is fabulously complex; Jane does such a lot with her. I loved her journey when we first met her in The Fourth Doctor Adventures The Syndicate Master Plan as PC Ann Kelso - the gradual awakening to her true special agent identity. And I wanted to hear more of Ann! Putting her back on 20th century Earth, undercover, was an absolute joy, with the timetravel-meets-police Life on Mars / Ashes to Ashes vibe as a bonus.

"Getting the go-ahead to use the Voord was amazing. Their appearance is pure evil, the ultimate in sinister – and they fitted my story perfectly as an alien species



who could be mistaken for drug smugglers by the Metropolitan police. And there is another species from early **Who** that I reckoned would fit right in to 1980s London. I was over the moon to be able to write for them both."

THE THAL from G.R.A.C.E. by Felicia Barker continues the adventures. Felicia says: "At the very start, my brief was really wide open. John gave a few references for tone and style, and what existing elements of canon were on the table, but other than that I was free to throw out anything. I don't remember if I latched on to the idea of exploring the Thals immediately, but it was pretty early on, and the final story is pretty substantively the same one I first drafted. There are some characters, themes and macguffins that weave into the wider picture,



but they all fit very nicely with the plot I pitched to begin with.

"There are lots of Thals. They're a huge part of Terry Nation's stories, but they've never really been explored as a focus in their own right so much as they are an adjunct to the Daleks. The biggest spotlight they get is when they're still on Skaro – by now a spacefaring race. They've settled multiple planets, but they're lost their homeworld, and they're still, still, fighting an existential war with the Daleks. What does their society look like? And how does it get along with Earth and the Space Security Service? In the process of this adventure, we get to ask some probing questions about the attitudes of the Service itself.

"This was some of the most fun I've had writing. It's the first time I've been in on something brand-new right from the inception, which was a fantastic experience, and it felt like we all shared a really vivid idea of what the project is. It remains one of my favourite scripts I've ever written."

STORY THREE is Allegiance by Angus Dunican. Angus says the commission was: "Mega exciting! I've written a couple of well-received Short Trips and have been hammering away at the coalface of The Eleventh **Doctor Chronicles** with Alfie Shaw for a while so the opportunity to step away from the Doctor and tell a different kind of story was very tantalising. I was in the cast of the immersive theatrical adventure Time Fracture at the time (which shared plot elements with the Dalek Universe line, featuring Anya and Mark) so I was feeling comfortably steeped in the expanded Whoniverse.

"I was given a lot of latitude. I knew Simon and John were interested in having the antagonist be a certain type of character (more I shan't say), that they had a plan of what the following story would be and that they wanted something that had a spy adventure feel to it. So I looked to those kinds of things for the structure and pace of reveals then layered over it with a lot of fun space opera vibes. Besides that though, I was left to dream away.

a brand-new series. There is often some aural and visual precedence, as in the case of **Space Security**Service, but there is a certain amount of freedom to create the world and the sound. And that's the best bit!

"Jane and Joe are fantastic to work with. They are full of ideas and solutions, and there is always the sense of a twinkle in the eye. has been active for four thousand years, so we dispensed with the need for an introduction. Expect intrigue, wild rides, threat, loss, laughs and Daleks!"

Mark himself, actor Joe Sims, says: "We started recording **Dalek Universe** with David Tennant during lockdown which was absolutely magical. David's a mate of mine from our *Broadchurch* days so the idea of swashbuckling our way through time and space together was absolutely delightful, alongside the wonderful Jane. We had so much fun.

"I know lockdown was tough for many people. As a professional actor, we all wanted to scratch our creative itches when we weren't able to work. So the fact that we were all doing **Dalek Universe**, a bunch of creative people brought together online, was an amazing privilege.

"Big Finish is incredible because so many people are involved – actors, writers, musicians, producers, sound designers and so on – to create these wonderful worlds. I'm so proud of **Dalek Universe**. It was a brilliant thing to be able to come out of lockdown and say, 'Yeah, that's what I did.' I've got all the covers on my wall at home!

"My mates always say that to me,
'Whenever you go on TV, or podcasts
or you do interviews, you always
sound like a competition winner.'
And I genuinely feel like I am! I
can't wait for people to hear what
we've got in these Space Security
Service adventures – they are just
as epic as Dalek Universe!"



"It is (I hope) an exciting trail of intrigue encompassing space battles, gun/sword play, interplanetary diplomacy and questions on the difference between a cult and a culture. A shade more adult than an adventure with the Doctor but still more like Dan Dare than something like Torchwood."

Angus adds that: "A big highlight was getting to tell a story about these worlds and a particular character that I've been thinking about for 20 years. Over that time, I've been beaten to the punch by other IPs (elements of the TV series' Saga, Raised by Wolves etc) but the character of Cybele is very dear to my heart and I'm grateful that I finally got to write her. I wasn't able to sit in on the recording so I'm beyond excited to hear her brought to life by the wonderful Camille Burnett."

Director Barnaby Kay tells Vortex: "It's always thrilling to be part of

Can you have a twinkle in the ear? There was definitely that too. The guest stars were fantastic and it is always a great pleasure to work with Jon Culshaw and Nicholas Briggs.

"We get straight into the action! We may not have been aware of it, but the Space Security Service





THE EIGHTH Doctor was in a bit of a pickle when we last saw him during the Time War. He was trapped on a spacecraft after his great-grandson Alex had become possessed by an unknown entity and taken the TARDIS. And Alex wasn't alone as friend Cass was at his side.

But the Doctor wasn't by himself either as he was accompanied by Hieronyma Friend using a face played by Conrad Westmaas... **Time War Uncharted 2** – *Pursuit* resolves some of these situations, but asks more questions too.

Producer and script editor Matt
Fitton says: "David Richardson
fully handed me the reins for the
Uncharted series at the end of the
last box set. I'd been looking to
produce for a while—and I'm now
working on The Ninth Doctor
Adventures as well which is great.

"I'm the producer and script editor for this release, but I have to credit writer Tim Foley with coming up with some of the great concepts. And bringing in James Moran to write an episode was an easy decision to make as he's been handling Cass's story really well – there are particular ideas around her that we want to explore.

"Uncharted has taken the Doctor and friends into a different universe where things are not what they are in our normal universe – that gave us a lot of free rein within this Time War era. You can play



around a bit, change things up and make unexpected switches.

"The thing I really wanted to do was look at the conflict between the Doctor and Alex. At the end of the first set, Alex has stolen the TARDIS to explore the universe and do good. It's kind of taking after the Doctor, but he believes he can do it better.

"He's become disillusioned by what he's seen of the Doctor within the Time War – people are dying and the Doctor says he can't save everyone. Alex has Cass along with him, as a kind of conscience and trying to be that moderating voice of reason when he's off trying to do his own thing.

"Meanwhile, the Doctor is stuck on the disintegrating Kalanos, the timeship belonging to Hieronyma Friend, and he wants to set off in pursuit of the TARDIS, tracking its wake. The Doctor and Friend are thrown



together by circumstances which neither of them are happy about.

"Friend continues to be a mystery with a couple more faces in this set – Niky Wardley and Lizzie Hopley are both playing the devious diplomat..." Lizzie, who played the Doctor's companion Gemma Griffin, says: "It was lovely hearing Paul down the line at the recording. It was a pity it wasn't in person but that's the way it goes these days. It was funny revisiting Gemma again! I'd love to do a proper story with her – I'd have to come back to life first though..."

SPOIL OF War by Mark Wright picks up the adventure. Mark says his brief was: "To open the set, pick up the cliffhanger from the previous volume and get Alex and Cass off on their own adventure, to really let Alex try to do things his own way. And to play in this uncharted universe a little bit to see what it can throw back at them.

"It's Downton Abbey meets
Remains of the Day crossed with
Doctor Who! Alex and Cass lock
on to a strong signal that pulls the
TARDIS towards it, arriving at a
weird country house where the
dimensions shift and change around
them. Mrs Dennison, the butler, is
expecting them as guests at a special
gathering – but who are the other
guests? Meanwhile, the Doctor and
Friend are lost somewhere in the
uncharted universe, knowing that
somewhere ahead are Alex and Cass."

How difficult is it to write in the Time War era, when so much is in flux?

Mark explains: "If anything, it makes it easier. You can almost make up your own rules, and that's what I enjoy, tinkering around with things, having licence to create a strange backdrop that doesn't quite adhere to the laws of time and physics. You've got to be consistent and avoid just pressing a reset button, but there's a flexibility that gives you a lot of plot freedom."

Mark had a particular highlight: "Writing for Paul as the Eighth Doctor, so adding another Doctor to my list of those I've written for! Ilove the interplay between the Doctor and Friend, and also taking the partnership between Alex and Cass in a new direction. There's a big sister element to the relationship from Cass's point of view despite Alex trying to take control and move things away from 'the old man'. Cass is incredibly fond of him, incredibly annoyed with him and incredibly concerned about him."

THE TALE of Alex by Katharine Armitage continues the adventures. Katharine says: "It is so much fun to write for these characters, although I feel a little bad for saying that as the

characters themselves are not having

dive into the real heart of these wonderful characters and find out what they'll do when they're pushed that far.

"The brief was all about picking up from where the last box set let off: the Doctor and Alex are divided and for him, spinning tales of the great hero Alex. When the Doctor arrives on a planet that views Alex as their hero, he is instantly cast as the villain but the planet itself is trapped between shifting realities and right and wrong are up for grabs."

Alex is a tortured soul, which Katharine believes makes him interesting to write for. She explains: "Perhaps this is a little telling of my own soul's state, but inner turmoil can actually be easier to write. It might be because I feel that, at our core, all of us are quite similar in the things we actually want and the ways we torment

ourselves; there's a universality in suffering which you don't get nearer the surface of a character.

"Characters in pain make bad decisions which, in turn, creates good story – and writers tend to be rather sadistic. We like putting our beloved characters through hardship and heartbreak because it is much more interesting than an adventure in which everything goes well!"

SEE-SAW by James Moran is the third adventure in the set. James tells Vortex: "They will have to drag me kicking and screaming away from this series! I absolutely adore this team and the weird, splintered time zone they occupy. Right from the first one, it felt so right and fun and warm, and we've been able to play with some wild elements. I'll probably run out of ideas soon, but even then, I'll insist on coming back anyway. They'll just be stories where the Doctor and friends argue about TV for an hour...

"My brief was really just a reminder where everyone is, that they've





a fun time at all! The Doctor, Alex, Cass and even Friend are being pushed to their limits, forced to confront things they'd much rather run far away from (the Doctor especially), and no one's getting along. But it is really great writing this because you get to at odds with Cass and Friend thrown into the maelstrom this split creates. Plus we've got Sontaran Time Lords on their tails and the mysteries around Friend just keep getting weirder!

"Alex is stepping out of the Doctor's shadow and the universe is ready



split into two teams – one chasing the other – each one trying to prove that they're in the right and each one *sort of* in the right but possibly in the wrong way.

"I generally try to write standalone stories, so that I don't mess up actual continuity by accident. On this one I had a firm idea of what I wanted to do Matt liked it, but then I hated it when I'd outlined it and realised it didn't quite work. So the whole team got a surprise when I sent them a completely different idea and told them all that I didn't know what I was doing! I'm very, very fun to be around. But weirdly, when I got to script stage, it absolutely fell out of me, I could barely keep up with the words as they flowed out. Almost like someone else was speaking through me...

"I wanted to write a scary one this time, which is where the original outline went wrong – it was scary in my head and then not at all when it was down on paper. So I just sat back, threw everything away, and thought: 'What makes me scared?

THE CONCEPT OF A TIME WAR VERGES ON INCOMPREHENSIBILITY...

Nursery rhymes, kids saying creepy things and abandoned places.' Along with everything else, I'm an anxiety-ridden writer so everything scares me. But I thought those things could work together quite well, particularly when I started wondering, 'How does everyone know nursery rhymes? Who passes them down through the generations? And what if they got weaponised?'"

THE FIRST Forest by Tim
Foley concludes the action. Tim
says of writing in the Time War
era: "It's completely different.
The concept of a Time War
verges on incomprehensibility,
so you've got to work harder for the
stakes. For example, if anything can
happen, why should we care? So it's

about finding a narrative path through the storm. And we find that path with the characters. The universe might be fracturing and going a little wild, but we are following the Doctor and friends and we see this madness through their eyes. I find it a little intimidating at times, but as long as we stick with them, we should be okay!

"It's been such a departure for the range – no TARDIS, a fractured crew, a different timeline – but this is the story which points to where we're going with this series, and **Uncharted** as a whole. We're heading into a place that shouldn't exist and everything's coming to a head. There's going to be a sticky reunion, the meeting of a hero and an impossible death.

"It's great fun to push the regulars into uncharted territory (pun intended). The more I write for them, the more familiar I become with them and the more I want to take them to new places. They're all on interesting journeys. I've had some good conversations with Matt about the future of **Uncharted**, and it's great to see he's really considered what each of their arcs are."

Tim adds: "I love Hieronyma
Friend and her growth through
these stories. It's such an odd feeling,
having originated a character and
thinking they were a one-shot...
before watching other writers get
their hands on them and have lots
of fun! And how's this for a tease –
there's a line in this story that is the
key to her 'solution'. Just wait to hear
what Friend gets up to next..."





BRIGADIER WINIFRED

Bambera, UNIT's commanding officer in the UK in the 1990s, returns for a new series.

It's the dawn of the new millennium, and Winifred

Bambera and her loyal team of Sergeant Jean-Paul Savarin and Dr Louise Rix

are about to face gigantic new threats.

As the danger levels increase, will
our heroes rise to meet them – or will
they crack under the pressure?

Angela Bruce is back as Bambera in UNIT: Brave New World – Fractures which features three adventures: Kaiju by series script editor Robert Valentine, Debrief by Alfie Shaw and Shatterpoint by Mark Wright.

Alfie, who wrote for the first series, has also taken on the mantle of producer for this third set succeeding Emily Cook in the hot seat. Alfie says: "I really enjoyed working with Rob and Emily on the first run and loved

the team that they pulled together for UNIT: Brave New World. I knew Emily was definitely moving on after the first two volumes and after Rob and I had been chatting about something else, we started spitballing about what we'd like to do next, big picture wise.

"Fortunately we basically said the same thing, so we were off. This was early 2022, something like that. Definitely before the



first set was released. It's been a long road getting to where we are now, but it's great to work on."

Alfie admits to being a fan of the **Doctor Who** television episode Battlefield, from which this series spun-off. He explains: "Oh, I adore it. Being a 1990s child, I watched classic **Who** out of order, based entirely on what DVDs and VHSs I could get my hands on. Battlefield was my first UNIT story and Bambera was technically my first Brigadier. I'm pretty sure the next one I saw was Spearhead from Space, so I've done UNIT in entirely the wrong order!"

This box set, and the next, features the return of another UNIT officer from Battlefield with Lieutenant Zbrigniev played by Robert Jezek (known to Big Finish fans as the Sixth Doctor's penguin pal Frobisher).

Alfie says: "Yes, we treated Battlefield as the parent show instead of **Doctor Who**. I appreciate they are technically one and same, but if it was in *Battlefield*, we could bring it back – anything else was off-limits. So, I'm afraid there are no secret Daleks or Doctors (or shape-shifting penguins) hidden in volumes three and four.

"You have to pepper in the returning elements every now and again. Not only to anchor the series in the **Doctor Who** universe, but I think it's part of the appeal of these series in general. You have to do both the new and the established.

"It was a delight to have Robert in studio. It was a joy to watch him and Angela be reunited as those characters."

KAIJU OPENS the set.
Following an accident at High
Skelton Research Centre, UNIT is
called in. The dimension-crossing
experiments of Dr Hazel
Wayward have created a
catastrophic chain reaction within the

lab, but even as Bambera, Savarin and Rix get the meltdown under control, the energy levels rise. Something is coming through...

Vortex points out that UNIT: Brave New World got great reviews first time around. How did Rob find coming into this next run on the back of that?

Rob tells Vortex: "The reception to the first two sets gave us a great boost of confidence, and we basically went into volumes three and four knowing exactly where to take the series next. We already had our core UNIT team all set up. And because this UNIT iteration is very millennial, we knew it was going to be set in the year 2000 and not really be able to go much further than that, because you start to encroach on the new series and lose that 1990s flavour. We really wanted Zbrigniev to return in volume three too."

Rob continues: "My story, Kaiju, reintroduces Bambera's team and brings in the running theme of dimensions starting to crack and lots of dangerous things breaking through. Part of the fun established by Battlefield is to crib 1970s UNIT stories with a year 2000 twist so where Robot riffs on King Kong, I wanted Bambera to have an adventure that riffed on Godzilla. None of the other writers were particularly keen to take up that suggestion, however, so in the end I wrote that one myself!"

Rob also enjoyed working with the new producer, adding: "It's been brilliant working with Alfie on **UNIT: Brave New World.** He wrote the final story of the first volume and when he took over from Emily as producer, we were very much of one mind about where to take the series and the overall story we wanted to tell."

DEBRIEF BY Alfie is the second tale in this set.
Summoned to Geneva HQ,
Brigadier Bambera is reunited with her old sergeant, Tomasz
Zbrigniev. A UNIT operation has gone horribly wrong and it's up to

stories. I really like pulling all those plot strands together, and I also had the fun of being able to go full on with the alternative universe counterparts of our regulars."

Mark says that Shatterpoint is: "Die Hard in a large hadron collider – kind

How are these events linked?

"There's so much fun to be had with Bambera, and with this one there was double the fun as I was able to go full on with evil doubles, although I won't say who or how. Bambera, Rix and Savarin are a brilliant team, and writing their interplay gives you a lovely rhythm that gives the script its energy. And that all comes from the characters and the actor's brilliant performances. If you're stuck, Savarin will always have a dry comeback to push things along."

Mark also had a particular highlight of note. He explains: "Rob and Alfie's note to 'go Bond'. There's a lot of action here, lots of heroics from the team. I wrote with a lot of John Barry and David Arnold soundtracks in the background. I originally went for the title Death is Not the End to capture that feel, but Rob came up with Shatterpoint which is so much better!"

KNIGHTFALL, THE fourth box set of adventures with the UNIT: Brave New World team has also been recorded.
However, some long-standing fans of Doctor Who may remember that Knightfall was a working title for Battlefield...

Alfie tells Vortex: "The two box sets are interlinked, each containing a discrete set of stories. Fractures kicks off with UNIT going up against a kaiju before events take a more personal turn, and in Knightfall, Bambera's team crosses over to the Albion teased in Battlefield. It's a post-Merlin Camelot and there's something rotten in the heart of Albion." VORTEX



Bambera to determine what happened. If she doesn't... it will kill them all.

Alfie explains: "Debrief is a three-hander set in UNIT HQ in Geneva, Switzerland. Bambera's been sent to uncover what went wrong with Zbrigniev's operation. It's a little less action heavy than the opening and closing episodes.

"Bambera is always a delight to write for as she's got such a distinctive voice. What was really fun was pitting her against Zbrigniev. Last time they were on the same side, so it was interesting to change that dynamic and see what happens when you put them head-to-head."

Shatterpoint by Mark Wright is the concluding story where Bambera and Savarin are under arrest – for murder!

Mark explains: "I was given the box set finale, which also needed to set up the lead in to the next volume, while paying off all the beats from Rob and Alfie's brilliant

of! That was my elevator pitch when we first started throwing ideas around and it stuck in my head. The story starts with Bambera and Savarin under arrest and brought to UNIT HQ Geneva, accused of acts of terrorism and murder. Elsewhere, the Cross-Borders Institute of Cosmology beneath Lake Geneva is taken over by a hostile force that might be familiar...

ALTHOUGH THE Sixth

Doctor's adventures were too short on television with just two on-screen companions, he's flourished with Big Finish, and Peri and Mel have been bolstered by friends including Frobisher, Evelyn Smythe, Flip Jackson and Mrs Constance Clarke.

Miranda Raison – who featured on TV in *Daleks in Manhattan* and *Evolution of the Daleks* – was introduced in 2015 playing Mrs Constance Clarke, a Leading Wren in the Women's Royal Naval Service.

Producer David Richardson recalls: "I suggested to Nicholas Briggs and script editor Alan Barnes that we should create a companion role for Miranda. By that point, Miranda had done a number of guest roles for us, and made it clear how much she adores working for Big Finish. She's just lovely to have around, besides being so brilliant and endlessly castable.

"Nick and Alan were both very excited by the idea, and Alan went away and worked up the character of Constance."

Mrs Clarke first appeared in **The Sixth Doctor Adventures**: *The Last Adventure*, before her debut proper

in Criss-Cross written by Matt Fitton.

Matt says: "The thing about historical, even pseudo-historical, stories such as this is that research comes with the territory. And on a subject like Bletchley Park, I was very keen to respect the legacy of all the men and women who worked tirelessly in those draughty huts in the Buckinghamshire countryside. And of course I knew Colin would always do his homework and challenge any historical inaccuracy.

"With all the high-profile films and documentaries, everyone now seems to know something of the Enigma machine and those who cracked it, but there are so many unsung heroes who worked through the sodden Bletchley day.

"The research made fascinating reading: the women's accounts of day-to-day life at Bletchley Park, the matter-of-fact way in which they dealt with the secrecy, working all hours, taking tea in the canteen, organising dances and shows. Simply 'getting on with it' as they helped win a war, never knowing the full picture themselves until much later.

"Of course, in *Criss-Cross* we take a fictional member of this select band on board the TARDIS. Leading Wren Mrs Constance Clarke comes fully formed from the fertile imagination of Alan Barnes. It was just my job to place her in context and invent the circumstances in which the Doctor invites her aboard. Or rather in which Constance invites herself, with rather urgent reasons."

Miranda says: "The idea of coming in as a companion had been gently floated, and Big Finish asked if it was something I would be interested in doing. I replied, 'Absolutely.' I'd recorded one with Colin a few years previously, *The Wreck of the Titan*, and he was absolutely lovely.

"They told me my character would be a Wren, very much a strong feminist, living in a male world and working at the Bletchley Park site. This is a world where women aren't taken seriously, but they still have a lot to say.

"There's something about the 1920s, 1930s and 1940s which I find so exciting. These decades, as eras of emerging female emancipation, provide vivid characters which is why they're such wonderful periods to play – rather than the regency women who walk arm in arm around lakes with Darcy types and gossip behind fluttering fans at a ball!"

THINGS HAVE been complicated for Harry Sullivan and Naomi Cross. Having travelled with the Fourth Doctor then worked with UNIT in the 21st century, they continued their adventures with the Seventh Doctor. But now Harry (Christopher Naylor) and Naomi (Eleanor Crooks) are set to leave Sylvester McCoy's side.

In The Seventh Doctor

Adventures: Past Forward, the Doctor will be joined by another familiar face from his past in Ray (Sara Griffiths) – the chirpy Welsh motorbike enthusiast first seen in the 1987 television story Delta and the Bannermen.

Script editor Matt Fitton tells Vortex: "We've got Harry and Naomi finally reaching the end of their higgledy-piggledy journey with the Doctor and we're finally going to see where they end up. And, at the same time, the Doctor will pick up his new travelling companion who people will have already have heard something of in the latest Classic Doctors, New Monsters set.

"There's an awful lot of love for Ray because Sara made her so adorable and lovable from the word go. I've



spoken to Sara a few times about the character, picking up Ray again and seeing where she's been and what she's been doing. Sara's done a great job and it sounds brilliant.

"Ray has always been 'the companion that never was' as during the making of Delta and the Bannermen and the TV episode Dragonfire, she and Ace were considered as potential new companions – until they eventually decided to use Ace. We play with that a little bit, setting these stories late in the Seventh Doctor's era when he's tidying up loose ends and dealing with unfinished business."

THERE ARE three stories in this set: With the Angels Part One by John Dorney, Catastrophix by Lizzie Hopley and With the Angels Part Two, also by John. Matt continues: "We've got two two-parter stories here in John's

episodes, with Lizzie's two-parter adventure inside it. But you can listen to the Angels entire story then Lizzie's separately and it will still all make sense. I like the concept of trying to do something a little bit different."

When the Doctor's latest attempt to return Harry and Naomi home

goes awry, they find themselves recruited by UNIT for a special mission. A mission involving a new and terrifying breed of Weeping Angel.

Amid betrayal and manipulation, the Doctor and friends are trapped by a destiny they cannot escape. The future is calling... and so is the past.

John says: "T plotted the story with the Weeping Angels first, so I knew the circumstances of where they were coming from. I'd been listening to Roy Gill's beautiful Eighth Doctor story Albie's Angels in the audio anthology, Connections, and I was driving home when a thought popped into my head about an unusual, unique way of using the Weeping Angels. The moment I got in, I emailed Matt asking, "Is there a space for me to do a Weeping Angels story somewhere as I've had a really good idea?"

"Matt had this slot available and for various reasons the angle on the Weeping Angels worked out perfectly with what we wanted to do with Naomi and Harry.

"The twist I've got on the Angels is revealed very early on, about 10 minutes into part one. I'm not saying what it is, but I mentioned it at Gallifrey One and it got an 'ohh' from the room, which made me realise, 'Yeah, that is a good idea, isn't it?"

CATASTROPHIX BY Lizzie is sandwiched between the two Weeping Angel stories.

Harry Sullivan and Naomi
Cross are on Earth at two different points in a timeline that has gone badly wrong. Back in his own time with UNIT, Harry is in the Lake District, unaware of the horrors to come. Four decades on, Naomi is adrift on an ocean in an apocalyptic nightmare.

What is causing the Earth's unnatural end? As the Doctor scours the years, he meets someone from his past with the tools to help – a mechanic called Ray.

Lizzie says: "We needed the Doctor to pick up a new companion whilst dropping Harry and Naomi back to their respective timelines. Great things all start off with problem solving. Matt's concept was for the Seventh Doctor to be picking up loose threads and tidying up as he comes to the end of his life.

"John had a brilliant idea with the Weeping Angels which allowed us to shift around time-wise – and



corrupted timelines always means a fun plot. The Doctor is basically Columbo in a Panama hat so having him flitting between storylines fixing stuff suits him perfectly.

"Ray is a companion that never was and it is an honour to put her where she belongs. She is utterly right for the job – any job actually. I wish she was in my life with her toolbox. Writing the scene where the Doctor explains why he left her was like therapy.

"I'd only ever encountered Ray in the fabulously crazy Delta and the Bannermen. I rewatched it and was quite cross at how her story was left. I immediately found her voice and she kind of wrote herself on the page – I must have been a bit Ray in my younger life. I'm certainly great with an Allen key (although I did think it was an Alan key!)"

THE FINAL adventure is *With* the Angels Part Two.

A billionaire's birthday party on a super-yacht is the setting for the final battle with the Angels. And the Doctor is on the guest list.



The Bladukas family have no idea how dangerous these creatures are. But they're about to find out. Can an old friend help the Doctor prevent a tragedy?

John concludes: "It will become pretty obvious that this is me effectively doing a parody of the TV series Succession. When I wrote Didn't You Kill My Mother? for The Eleventh Doctor Chronicles: Victory of the Doctor, it sounded a bit like

the TV series Severance but it wasn't intended to be! Every now and then, you write something that seems a bit like something on TV. With the Angels is absolutely intended to be a riff on Succession which I had been

watching at the time. It had started off with a completely different plot before I realised this would be fun to do.

"Writing for Ray is an absolute hoot. Her positive energy is just a real delight to dive into. One thing that was slightly tricksy was a point where I really needed to lean into Ray being an engineer and having to source technical details of some things that are completely outside my area. Thankfully, other people were able to provide me with some interesting details about shipping!

"There are a couple of other things on web pages and web channels that I'm a fan of, so I decided to reference those too just for fun. If you know they're there and recognise them, you will spot them immediately. And if you don't know they're there, well, I'm not going to draw attention to them—they might be fun to discover!"

At long last, the Fourth Doctor and Leela are meeting a certain Lethbridge-Stewart...

ONE OF the joys of **Doctor Who** over the years has been seeing how Brigadier Alistair Lethbridge-Stewart reacts to a new incarnation of the Doctor and his travelling companions.

This June, the commander of UNIT will encounter Leela, warrior of the Sevateem, as two of the Doctor's best friends meet for the first time in **The Fourth Doctor Adventures**: The Ruins of Kaerula.

Jon Culshaw features as the Brigadier in three brand-new adventures starring characters from the Fourth Doctor's era circa 1977, with the Doctor (played by Tom Baker), Leela (Louise Jameson) and K9 (John Leeson).

Producer David Richardson says:
"I'm a big fan of the **Doctor Who**Peladon stories and the way they
explore an alien world by visiting
different times in its history. Our
Kaerula episodes follow a similar
path—it's a different world and a very

different story, but a chance to see the consequences of big events.

"The moment that Jon Culshaw started playing the Brigadier in The Third Doctor Adventures I knew I wanted to bring him into the Fourth Doctor range. As we record so far ahead, this was our first opportunity – released six years later! It's fair to say this won't be the last you'll hear of the Brig with the Fourth Doctor. Far from it. Tom and Jon just ignited together!"

The Remains of Kaerula and The Ruins of Kaerula have both been written by Phil Mulryne.

Time travel can always bring complications. The Doctor, Leela and K9 find themselves at different ends of strange temporal effects – from two time zones on the same planet to two locations that couldn't be more different. But the peril they find in all of these places is the same.

different feels and stakes. But they then fuse to make up a bigger story.

"The adventure as a whole has ended up pleasingly timey-wimey. The first story, *The Remains of Kaerula*, takes place generations after a planet has been ravaged by environmental instability, societal

"The second story reframes the first one in some ways. And both, of course, show how the Doctor gets his fingerprints all over events...!"

Phil continues: "The fun (and challenging) thing about this process was in writing two different adventures – with stories and worlds and plots that are quite distinct and discrete – but that are absolutely linked as part of one bigger story.

"There is some crossover with the characters (one in particular). But of course the Doctor and Leela and K9 are the primary crossovers. They come into the second story with a knowledge of 'the future' and how things will work out... or how they

Phil, a veteran writer for The Fourth Doctor Adventures, tells Vortex: "The thrill of writing for the Fourth Doctor doesn't ever diminish. It's just such a joy the way this Doctor's adventures can combine action, high stakes and humour. Plus knowing that Tom's iconic voice will end up delivering the script – bringing his own sense of fun and the richness of that performance to the end story.

"The initial idea was that we didn't want to do a conventional four-parter with one story across four episodes. But we decided it might be fun to have some kind of link between two shorter stories, interweaving them together.

"Both halves to the story work as distinct, cracking adventures in their own right. And we got the chance to do two very different stories in different environments with



disorder and population collapse. The world has recovered – but the people living there are now at odds with an influx of refugees and have corralled them together into a camp.

"In the second story, The Ruins of Kaerula, we go back in time, into the midst of the planet's crisis, with the population struggling for a way to survive and perhaps escape the situation they're facing.

David says: "We recorded *Cry* of the Banshee back in 2019. It was, in fact, one of Tim Foley's very first scripts for Big Finish."

John adds: "Tim is a mainstay at Big Finish these days. This is technically the second **Doctor Who** script he's written, but his first after 'breaking away' from the **Torchwood** gang. I'd been listening to a lot of the **Torchwood**

right – I was coming at them from a **Torchwood** perspective and they were a bit gritty and political. John was great at helping me get the new tone. I was then asked if the story could be set off-world, and the question became how to remember thinking to myself, 'If this is my only shot, what would I want my story to have?' So it's packed to the rafters with spooky moments, deadpan humour and plot surprises. Everything I like my adventures to be!
