I went to see Jon's show in Edinburgh in 2023 and he did a superb Billy Connolly – I've always thought that if you made Billy sound more posh, you'd get Peter Capaldi! I knew that Jacob Dudman was hanging up his shiny Doc Martins for Big Finish, so sent Nicholas Briggs a text to tell him that I had found a great possible replacement. And now here he is.

So, on behalf of the five million people of Scotland, I officially approve of Jon as Peter's Twelfth Doctor – who is staring at me from my wall calendar as I type!

### SINCE DOCTOR Who

returned to our television screens in 2005, it's been a regular fixture over the festive period. But surprisingly, not many stories have tapped into other seasonal events. There was an episode to loosely tie in with Easter Planet of the Dead and more recently The Halloween Apocalypse, the first episode of the Thirteenth Doctor's adventure Flux.

Incredibly, there's only been one other standalone story set at

Halloween, Mark Morris's Tenth Doctor novel Forever Autumn – although Mark Gatiss's Eighth Doctor audio Invaders From Mars is set at Halloween in 1938.

But now, that's all changing, thanks to Halloween: Sea Smoke and Other Stories. The release features four spooky tales: Sea Smoke by Jonathan Sims, Party Favours by Georgia Cook, Bramble King by Noga Flaishon and Merlin's Trap by Hannah Kennedy.

Dare you step into the shadows? Terror awaits across time and space. Silent assassins, primordial evils, and horrors that defy imagination – the Doctor's universe has never been more terrifying.

The release was Noga's idea so she spoke to senior producer John Ainsworth about the possibility of the collection. Noga, who also produced the release, tells Vortex: "I approached John in around the summer of 2024 and begged to do it! As it happened, executive producer Jason Haigh-Ellery had a similar idea so it all came together very fortuitously.

"I love horror stories and horror movies – watching them, reading them, writing them – and Halloween has always been my favourite holiday, so I really wanted to create an anthology that celebrates and revels in spooky stories. Script editor John Dorney and I then gathered the SEA SMOKE opens the set. The First Doctor and Dodo arrive on the Scottish isle of Ulfsay during the height of the 19th-century boom in kelp burning. They quickly realise something is wrong as the smoke from the latest batch of 'kelp' begins to cause horrific transformations in the island's people.

writers, and I'm really proud of what they've all created."

Was Noga surprised to learn that Big Finish hadn't produced something like this before?

She says: "Yes! There are so many Big Finish stories that are objectively nightmare fuel, and yet nothing quite like this before - that felt insane to me.

"Right now, cinema is experiencing a bit of a golden age of horror, and horror translates to audio beautifully, with chilling works such as The Holmwood Foundation, The Magnus Archives, Old Gods of Appalachia, and more. There's real value in marketing something as decidedly horror: it gives people who aren't so keen on scary stories the chance to sit this one out, while giving the horror nerds among us something to really sink our teeth into."

Noga says: "This is the Big Finish debut for Jonathan – the creator of the podcast *The Magnus Archives* and *The Magnus Protocols*. If you know his work already, you'll know he's one of the scariest writers out there — especially on audio.

"It's a classic gothic horror story featuring the First Doctor (played by Stephen Noonan) and Dodo special place in my heart, and I always thought about how cool it would be to have a crack at writing a story for it.

"Unusually for this sort of work, it was just like I expected it to be. I have never worked with a team that so genuinely, passionately cares about the world they work in than the team at Big Finish care about the Doctor and his companions. I've always had a huge fondness for the historical stories that the TARDIS and its passengers end up in; nothing delights me more than the idea of shining a light into an obscure corner of history... and then putting a horrible space monster in it!

"I'm very grateful that I've been allowed to add a new one to the list, and can only apologise for all the wet meaty sounds the editors have had to add (I don't even want to think about how they collected the foley!)." THE SECOND adventure Party Favours features UNIT. All Bev wants to do is host her yearly Halloween party and heal her fractured relationship with her girlfriend, Annika. Unfortunately, her reclusive upstairs neighbours have been invited to the festivities, and all they want to do is feast.

Noga describes this as: "A UNIT adventure featuring Osgood and Kate. It's set in the modern day, brings back

"A Halloween horror story set in the world of **Doctor Who!** Preferably Doctor-light, which was very exciting for me. I love the notion of ordinary people facing down monsters the Doctor deals with on a daily basis, letting us see just how dangerous they truly are."

The writer sums the story up as: "The worst house party you've ever attended! I loved writing the relationship at the heart of this in director Helen Goldwyn's cast are Liv Andrusier (Bev), Saffron Coomber (Annika), Nicole Davis (Alice) and Jack Ayres (Tim).

BRAMBLE KING has been written by Noga and features the Eighth Doctor and Lady Audacity Montague. The Doctor and Audacity encounter a strange vision which leads them to Walpurgis-9, a cargo ship drifting powerless through space. In their attempt to assist the ship's crew, they become entangled in their secrets and encounter the malevolent entity known as the 'Bramble King'.

Noga says: "My story is sort of a dark fairy tale in space, and I wanted to pay homage to some of my favourite horror films including Solaris and Event Horizon. With the Doctor (Paul McGann) is Audacity (Jaye Griffiths) – out of all the companions, she's my favourite so I was thrilled to have the chance to work with her on this one."

Directed by Steven Kavuma, the cast includes Jamie Kenna (Otto), Judith Jacob (Gretchen) and Felicity Cant (Reinke).

Merlin's Trap concludes the set. When Lainey leads an expedition into the ancient Merlin's Cave system, the group is warned by Merlin's ghostly voice to explore no further. As Lainey and her team push deeper into the mysterious cave, they encounter things far beyond their comprehension, including Merlin himself.

This story is notable as it features Jon Culshaw capturing the dulcet Glaswegian tones of Peter Capaldi's Twelfth Doctor.

Noga says: "Another Big Finish debut with this story from Hannah. Out of all the adventures in this set, I think this one scared me the most. It's set in the modern day and involves caving (which I am abjectly terrified of). It's a real ensemble piece and great to record."

Hannah says: "I've known Noga since lockdown when we worked together on an anthology of stories about the end of the world for a night of online theatre. Since then, I've been so fortunate to have had her as a champion of my writing. I love working with her, so when she reached out and asked me if I would be interested



a fan-favourite monster to audio, and it will absolutely rip your heart out."

Vortex asks Georgia what her first reaction on being asked to be involved was: "Heck yes, a Halloween audio script!"

A keen horror writer, Georgia was delighted to mix this with her love of **Doctor Who**, saying it was: "So much fun! I always love being allowed to write a horror (or even a little bit spooky) script for Big Finish, and this was no exception.

"Merlin's Trap follows a group of cavers who are on an expedition to map out a previously unexplored cave system in Cornwall. However, they soon discover more than just hidden chambers and ancient caverns. There's something else deep in these caves and it wants them gone. Cue the 'dun dun dun!'

"One of the reasons we landed on caving for this story was that I find the idea of being deep down in an unexplored and potentially deadly cave is truly horrifying already, without adding any ghosts, aliens or monsters into the mix. I'm not personally a fan of caving, but I admire the bravery of those who are."

almost completely chronologically, and it was such a treat. It felt as though we were venturing deeper and deeper into the cave with the characters in real time. I can't wait for everyone to hear the performances of the amazing actors we had on board."

On being cast in the role, Jon recalls: "There are so many different facets to Peter Capaldi's Doctor. A great, moral character, a beautiful, supremely witty sense of impatience at times, but desperately, desperately caring.

"The Twelfth Doctor has such mystery and so many aspects of the earlier Doctors. The irascibility but lovability of the First. The wit and merriment of the Second and the Fourth. The warmth and charm of the Third and Tenth. Every little aspect is like a beautifully cut diamond and it catches the light in its own way.

"And to watch that era over and over to prepare for playing the Twelfth question of! I love being scared in fiction... I guess the only way to find out how truly scary it is would be to give it a listen?" VORTEX

Producer Noga Flaishon says: "I love this adventure so much. It's a ghost story and a mystery but at its heart it's really a family drama. No matter how many twists and turns the plot takes (and there are plenty), that emotional core is what holds it all together. And of course, having Yaz and the Doctor crash a dinner at the court of Henry II is such a fun idea – it feels so classically **Doctor Who**."

Noga agrees that Lisa McMullin was the obvious choice to approach as the writer. She says: "Lisa is a writer I've wanted to work with for a long time. I love her work (and she's a wonderful human being) so I knew I wanted her to be part of the initial group of writers for the Thirteenth Doctor. It was also

crucial to me to hit a balance of new and familiar writers. I know many people will be very excited to see Lisa's take on the Thirteenth Doctor."

With the story being set in history, it fits in with the television series mould.

Noga explains: "For this range, we wanted to strike a balance between stories set in the past, present and future. The first episode begins in contemporary times with a very familiar setting, while the second takes us to a completely alien planet

with high-concept sci-fi. And now for this third episode, I wanted to ground us in something more recognisable.

"Part of the fun of having a TARDIS is getting to travel all across time and space, so it felt crucial to make the most of that by going somewhere historically significant. While working on this episode, I ended up going down a bit of a Wikipedia

time for the festive season. Lionesses in Winter is about a dysfunctional family forced together for Christmas jollity when it's the last thing any of them are in the mood for. Sound familiar? And it becomes increasingly clear that supernatural unpleasantness is afoot, intrinsically linked to their family secrets and traumas. But it's fun too!

rabbit hole learning much more about Eleanor of Aquitaine – someone I knew very little about beforehand."

So I relished the chance to work with her and to learn from her too – she takes notes with such ease and is a true professional. What a treat!



The standard was really high and the scripts were all so different. It wasn't just about which ones made us laugh the most but about spotting potential in the writing. We were looking for originality, strong characters and something that

would really come alive on audio as well as potentially be turned into a full series further down the line."

Script editor Jonathan Morris adds: "For a couple of years, a long time ago, I made a living writing sitcoms that got optioned or piloted. I've been through the process of doing a dozen drafts or more of the same 30-page script, just trying to make it 15 per cent funnier. So it was really exciting for me to be on the other side of the table, using my expertise from all the audios I've written, to try to make each script the very best it could be."

VORTEX ASKS how different is it script editing comedy, compared to drama? Jonny replies: "It has all the things you worry about with drama – story, character, dialogue – but with the added complication that it has to be funny, very frequently. So you have to work much harder but, when you get a line that does plot, character and is funny all at once, you know you've cracked it. A lot of the process is taking out jokes which don't work



rather than adding them, as a misfiring joke is actively annoying. And then questioning each funny moment to ask if there could be another version which is even funnier."

Summing up each comedy, Jonny says: "Scribbling is about an aspiring writers' group, a coming-together of obsessives, eccentrics and people who just want to get out of the house. Square Peggs is a gentle, character-based piece, the sort of thing you'd get on a Sunday night on BBC One starring Judi Dench and Peter Egan. Members is set in the House of Commons during the Georgian era, so there's an obvious comparison with Blackadder and Python-adjacent things like Ripping Yarns and Jabberwocky.

"Golden Sands is set in a declining seaside town where the only businesses are a gift shop, a bookies and a chippie – basically Broadchurch with jokes. Sad Sunk Rock is about a team of marine biologists stuck on an island in the middle of the Atlantic, all going a little bit strange, but it's more like the cult sitcom Nightingales than Father Ted. And The Cracks Are Showing is a wild, freewheeling ride through hell with more than a touch of Douglas Adams."



Lizzie tells Vortex: "My favourite thing about Scribbling is how distinctive each of the characters is, and how utterly batty they all are in their own way! We were crying with laughter on the recording day. For Square Peggs, it would have to be how accurate and relatable it is. Having grown up in the country, I was howling at the little details that were just spot on. Members has a hint of Blackadder with some great character performances. You can't help but feel sorry for the main character in Sad Sunk Rock and how his life has

panned out. There is a mindfulness section in *Golden Sands* which is hilarious, but the episode also reminded me of the kind of TV shows I watched growing up. And *The Cracks Are Showing* is utterly bizarre and hilarious and unlike almost anything you've heard before!"

THE PRODUCTIONS include an array of recognised television stars and comedy talent including Jessica Martin, Siobhan Redmond, Forbes Masson and Sacha Dhawan, as well as a number of Big Finish regulars.

Jonny says: "We've got some great

Jonny says: "We've got some great casts. And in that I very much include





the Electric Head duo of Alan and Cy performing their own script, The Cracks Are Showing, as well as legends like Forbes and Siobhan from The High Life, Judy Flynn from The Brittas Empire and most of the cast of Members plucked from musicals in London's glittering West End."

Lizzie adds: "It was lovely to work with so many people that I haven't previously worked with. I've known Sacha and Sagar Radia for quite a while so it was fun to be on a project like this with them. The casts brought such sharpness and energy to the recording sessions and it takes a special actor to nail comedy well. It's one thing to read a funny script but to hear these actors bring it to life? That's when the magic happens and when you know you've got something special on your hands.

"The idea to cast Sacha came about when we were on a panel together at Chicago TARDIS last year. I mentioned that I was producing some comedy pilots and he seemed intrigued, so I pitched this to him and his agent and that was that.

I think Big Finish fans will enjoy hearing him in such a different role."

How exciting is it to be doing something rather different for this release? Lizzie says: "It's been great if slightly terrifying at times! I'm very lucky in that I have been able to work on a variety of different projects for Big Finish but comedy is a first. Once we got stuck in, it felt fresh and fun and honestly, who doesn't want to spend their days working on scripts that actually make you laugh out loud?"

Jonny agrees: "I really enjoy the process of working with the writers, mostly just giving them pointers in terms of the grammar of audio, but also pushing them to make each script the best possible showcase for their work. And, as you'd hope, the days in the studio were lots of fun as the characters on the pages suddenly spring into life. All you're trying to do is to capture that comic energy on the studio's hard drive. Since then I've been going through the dialogue, sound effects and music edits with the directors -tweaking things, tightening things, loosening other things - just to make sure that everything is working to enhance the comedy."

Jonny concludes: "The most important thing about these pilots is that we want to do more. The casts are there, the writers are there. So please support this release and show that there is an audience for situation comedy, and we will be able to make one – or some – of these pilots into series." WORTEN

The word 'Causeway' has been seeded throughout his adventures with Charley and Audacity, and now their destination is the Causeway itself... Worlds will collide and for one of the TARDIS team, life will never be the same again.

"This set is a favourite of mine; the writers have instilled a real sense of awe into the stories. The first is all about the awe of exploring space — and the thrills and threats of this new frontier; and the second is about the awe of travelling through time. They're both adventures that stretch the imagination and feel like proper blockbuster (audio) movies, while still finding time to dig deeper into

the psyches of our trio of travellers."

The Eighth Doctor (Paul McGann) and his companions – Edwardian adventuress Charley Pollard (India Fisher) and Regency aristocrat Lady Audacity Montague (Jaye Griffiths) – will begin to unravel the mystery of the Causeway while on a dangerous expedition into deep space, at an anachronistic business venture in Copenhagen and meeting visitors from another reality.

Lost Amongst the Stars has been written by Rochana Patel.

The Doctor wants to find a challenge for Charley and Audacity. All of time and space awaits, with wonders beyond



their wildest dreams and darkest nightmares, but are they truly ready to venture further out amongst the stars?

Rochana says: "I was thrilled to be asked to write for the Eighth Doctor and Charley, as for me they're a pivotal **Doctor Who** team, who very much kept the series alive during the tail end of the wilderness years when the TV show was off air. At that critical time, they were very much the current Doctor and companion. And so, to jump in now as a writer, having been an avid fan and listener during those early adventures, is an absolute privilege.

"I actually started the pitching process for this story a long time ago, way back in 2023, for an earlier box set. As far as I can remember, the brief was fairly open ended, but at the time the TV series was doing a lot of fun and fantastical stories so I very much honed in on going in the opposite direction. I instead chose to do a big, hardcore science-fiction horror story as I believe the audio

adventures always need to push in other ways to the TV series. We need to be bigger, bolder and different!"

SUMMING UP the story,
Rochana says: "The Doctor,
Charley and Audacity team up
with a group of space explorers
to help them find a missing
crewmember... On a planet
where there's no atmosphere, their
suits can only carry so much air, and
time is running out..."

The writer was delighted to craft a tale for this particular TARDIS team.

Rochana explains: "There's a very special chemistry between Charley and Audacity. They're both historical companions which gives them a unique perspective on the universe. In most TARDIS crews, there's normally at least one contemporary, future or alien companion who serves as a grounding point for the audience, but with these two we get to see everything through the lens of their respective time periods. It's fun, and different, and makes time-travel that little bit more special. It's the reason I love historical companions



- I think we need more of them!

"So far, I've not done a lot of hardcore sci-fi scripts, but I love writing them. To get this TARDIS team out onto a truly alien world, with no breathable atmosphere, was tremendously fun – and it has left me with a hankering to create adventures in some even stranger alien environments!"

The Time You Never Had by Tim Foley features the return of the Silurians. The adventure guest stars Richard Hope who played Silurian characters in the TV episodes The Hungry Earth, Cold Blood and The Wedding of River Song. Richard reprises his role as a Homo Reptilia, the enigmatic Mr Barabbas.

Tim says: "I feel very attached to the TARDIS team of the Eighth Doctor, Charley and Audacity. It's both calling back to the era of Big Finish I grew up with, whilst pushing ahead with its own story.

"I was a bit nervous about including Silurians at first but then Matt Fitton, the script editor, pointed out that an



aspect of this story allowed us to use them in a whole new way. He's clever like that! He's a great script editor, forever giving us writers space to add stuff to his series outline. Causeway emerged somewhat organically through the writing process of my first Audacity story (the Silurians were initially seen in The Great Cyber War... or were they?!), but it's all building towards something fun...

"Til be vague about the story details because it's best to go in without any foreknowledge (you can probably guess that from the elusive synopsis!) – but I will say it's the end of this chapter and the start of a new one. The Causeway is waiting... and one character will be forever altered by its presence. Listen out for the shocking post-credits scene!"

INDIA FISHER is delighted to be back as everyone's favourite Edwardian Adventuress. She says: "I have been playing Charley for more than half my life which is a scary thing!

Thinking about that makes me feel old, but the great thing is that because this is audio, I can still play a 19-year-old. Everyone writes so well for her.

"It's always lovely to be back as Charley. She is one of my favourite people and there are some great stories coming up for Charley and Audacity. There's a really lovely enriching of their relationship, which I am thrilled about because I think they work so well together. Jaye and I get on incredibly well, and both love acting too.

"This run with Audacity has really brought Charley on again, and she feels as though she's growing in her relationship with the Doctor. I suppose another companion coming along has changed things too; there's another strong female. You might think that two alpha female personalities wouldn't really work but actually it does – and it works brilliantly. The poor Doctor gets a bit of a hard time, but he can hold his own!

"These two stories are beautiful in the way that they bring the relationship further forward. I'm really interested to see how it progresses – and I love the way that Charley has started calling Audacity 'Dassy'!

"We've got brilliant scripts from Tim and Rochana. I really love my adventures with the Eighth Doctor and Audacity, Charley has some beautiful moments. There's a lovely



bit where Charley is dragged away and gets kidnapped again. She sees a huge, hideous monster coming at her and is convinced it's a demon. She then realises, 'Oh, it's just an alien.' And that relaxes her – she can deal with an alien! She's been travelling so long with the Doctor that she's perfectly happy with the fact that it's just an alien species!

"And there's a moment in the other story when Audacity comes in and says, 'I'm afraid a lizard from the dawn of time has arrived,' and Charley simply replies, 'Of course it has.' I love things like that."

charley and Audacity very quickly befriended one another, which reflects the off-mic chemistry and friendship between India and Jaye. Script editor Matt Fitton agrees: "We knew that on paper, these two were a good mix as a companion pairing as they're both strong-willed, intelligent women. Jaye and India really hit it off and

have had a great time together and with Paul. It's one of those things where the chemistry in studio was even more than we could have hoped for."

Vortex asks Matt about the ongoing series and asks how the conceit of the Causeway connection came about? Matt explains: "The idea came from Tim, really. It was his idea to start seeding things around Audacity's tenure in the TARDIS, which may go some way to explaining why this is the first we've heard of it. Things start to

come to more of a head now she's a bit of a seasoned traveller. She's really put through the ringer in the two stories in this set.

"It's sort of like the Bad Wolf connection in the Christopher Eccleston series, we're sowing seeds for the listeners to pick up down the line because, obviously, everything needs to work in its own right as a story. People can pick up individual releases, but we hope that once the bigger picture starts to emerge, they will then dip back in and see how the whole jigsaw has been put together."

Although we're now hearing about the Causeway, there's still a while to go until we find out who's behind the mystery.

Matt says: "Oh yes, we have more plans, Tim and I. Things are revealed in this set which are setting things up for the future... but we're not going to give that away now! We'll find out in time what's behind the Causeway."

How does Matt, as a fan, find working on long-reaching storylines when he knows the eventual outcome? He tells *Vortex*: "Yes, it does spoil the surprise a bit, but it's lovely to be involved in this because I know what it's like when you get those surprises.

"When I listen to other ranges and stories where I've had no input whatsoever, I get to be properly hoodwinked. It's such fun, feeding in the twists and turns, and working out how best to gradually reveal all the mysteries that we've built."

Every Dalek Masterplan needs a figurehead. Who better than the nephew of Mavic Chen, the greatest traitor in the galaxy? Someone has to break the news to Sidney. James is delighted with We Don't Talk About Mavic Chen.

He says: "Tim's episode arrived triumphant in my inbox and hasn't stopped making me grin ever since.

"It's a lovely story about fandom and about problematic relatives. It's about Sidney Chen, the infantilised younger scion of the Chen Dynasty, and his struggles to come to terms with his ancestor's murky past. But it's also beautifully funny."

Tim adds: "I'm really enjoying this new format for **Bernice Summerfield**. James and I realised the half-hour length is both useful for new writers to get to grips with audio writing, or for writers more familiar with Big Finish to try something a little experimental.

"When we were coming up with the episode outlines, I thought the hook of this adventure was very cute. And having co-written the finale of last year's Bernice Summerfield series, The Eternity Club, I thought it would be nice to embrace the calm before the storm this time!

"We're with Benny on the planet Kimble, trying to persuade an unusual collector not to side with the Dalek menace. But as ever, not all is as it seems. My highlight is a 'recreation' of a piece of Dalek history..."

## **BLAKE'S 7: GHOST SHIP**



BLAKE'S 7 IS a series with story types of all kinds – political intrigue, thrillers, adventure and outright science fiction. Horror and scares were very much the order of the day in the full-cast adventure Ghost Ship, part of the second season of audios from Big Finish produced by Cavan Scott.

Writer Iain McLaughlin recalls: "Blake's 7 has an emotional place in my heart because of watching it with my dad. I think I was 10, pushing towards 11, when it started and so we were still watching stuff together. There's a lot of family and relationship stuff tied in to my memories of Blake's 7, so having the chance to write for it was something I jumped at.

"I was asked to make this episode scary using a very small cast in terms

of numbers. The great thing was that I had Vila as an option. When it comes to Blake's 7 and Vila being scared, I always think of the television episode Orbit. That wonderful bit at the end where Vila is hiding from Avon because he knows Avon's going to turf him out of the airlock. It was genuinely unsettling and that was how scared I wanted Vila to be now.

"We came up with making it a ghost story early in the discussions –possibly even the first chat. I think one of the scariest things you can do is make someone's home, the place they are used to feeling at their safest, into something very scary – so for Vila that would be the Liberator."

Iain continues: "I've always liked a good ghost story, and I've always thought that darkness and silence are incredibly frightening. Absence of the usual noises is unsettling and it makes any sound you do then hear all the more jarring. In the first draft, I tried to make silence almost like a character, something oppressive, but it didn't quite work and ran short. So I had a rethink and found a way to use the dark and silence."

The adventure did pose a particular problem for Iain. He explains: "Having a character alone is a challenge on audio, giving them lines when they have nobody to talk to can be tricky. It can sound forced or false. The good thing for me is that Vila often talks to himself! So it wasn't a stretch for a scared Vila to speak out loud to avoid the oppressive nature of silence. And once I started to hear Michael Keating's voice as I was writing the dialogue, it really started to come together. "The final version is elevated by good performances, and I have to give a lot of credit to Cavan and script editor Justin Richards who nudged and shoved the story along in the right direction. I also really liked that they gave me that sort of shopping list at the start - small cast, spooky story, that kind of thing. There are a few things I'd probably do differently if I was writing it now, but I'm really pleased with how it turned out." VORTEX



# VORTEX CONTINUES ITS IRREGULAR SERIES TALKING WITH THE PEOPLE WHO BRING AUDIO ADVENTURES TO LIFE IN MEET THE MAKERS — WITH MATT FITTON.



WHEN THE Sirens of Time was first released in 1999, Matt Fitton immediately ordered a copy. He had been bitten by the Doctor Who audio bug from Big Finish. As a subscriber, he followed the ongoing adventures of the various Doctors and then, when a writer's opportunity arose to submit a single 25-minute episode, he sent in a proposal.

In August 2011, Matt's first script A Most Excellent Match was produced by Big Finish as part of The Monthly Adventures release Recorded Time and Other Stories with the Sixth Doctor and Peri.

Matt recalls: "My story was actually first submitted to the open writer's opportunity Big Finish held in 2010 so started life as a Fifth Doctor and Nyssa adventure. Entrants were

asked to submit a short synopsis plus a sample page of script. When it was announced that Rick Briggs's Entropy Composition was the chosen winning submission, I chalked it up to experience and thought no more about it.

"But I received an email several months later from Alan Barnes saying my entry was one of a few other stories they'd liked and wanted to develop, and could I revise the synopsis for the Sixth Doctor. In fact, the premise worked even better with this most literary of Doctors, and after some tweaking to allow for Peri's part in the proceedings, the final storyline was pretty close to the original one I'd written for the Fifth."

SINCE THEN, Matt has become a mainstay of Big Finish, as a writer and script editor on a number of ranges. And now, he's taken the step up as producer of The Eighth Doctor – The Time War and The Ninth Doctor Adventures ranges.

Matt continues: "I was working in a day job alongside my Big Finish work over most of the time I was writing and script editing. I wanted to move more towards my creative side and I'd talked a bit with producer David Richardson about working with him in terms of possibly co-producing and working alongside him.

"The producer's job really interested me in terms of what it entails, beyond the parts of the process that I was already seeing as a script editor. As script editor, you're involved with the producer in the concept of a particular box set or story and in picking writers, then assigning themes or particular elements that you want to be included. But the producer sees the whole production through to the end release.

"Often, a script editor or writer will go into studio and hear the recordings happen, and I've always enjoyed that. So the idea of being a producer and actually organising those days, putting them together, was an interesting and fun aspect for me. There's also everything that comes afterwards in terms of what you don't do as a script editor, such as getting to hear the edits, picking sound designers and composers, then working with them towards the final release. You're also looking at cover art, and all of that really stirred my creative senses."

Matt admits that the organisational side of the job has an appeal too. He explains: "Yes, even all the organisation appeals – managing budgets, schedules and so on – it scratches the spreadsheet itch which my brain likes! I stopped working at my day job, which was an economic consultancy, so producing has fulfilled that side as well.

"This is about being able to put all

the pieces together, as a producer you get to steer the whole ship. It's been really interesting and fun. I've really enjoyed it, and I particularly like working with the director and casting. That's one of my favourite things, working out which voices are going to work for each character and in which episodes, and I also enjoy approaching the agents and dealing with them. Sometimes, with guest star casting, you shoot for the moon and sometimes, you do get people you might not think would do a Big Finish. Some of the bigger name actors are interested if they've got a spare day and fancy doing a Doctor Who!

"Depending on the range, there's a challenge to capture the tone of the era, which is what we're currently doing with the Ninth Doctor and Rose, but then we want to do new



things inside that and fit what we can into the television run with Christopher Eccleston and Billie Piper.

"In contrast, with something like **The Eighth Doctor – The Time War**, all bets are off in a way. Here, we're in unknown territory, as we're dealing with an era where we can really be out there and strange, to go to weird and wonderful places with it. As the producer, you're really working on anything and everything between those two extremes."

Matt concludes: "It's all been a real joy so far, but if you pressed me

to pick out one single highlight, it would have to be taking the reins on The Ninth Doctor Adventures and working with Chris and Billie. It's been so good seeing just how engaged and happy they are with the scripts and the productions. They're obviously enjoying being back together again and you can hear that in the final product. Everybody who's working on this range has a real love for the material, and recapturing that is very, very special." VOSEEN
